# BRINGING OPERA TO YOU

In September 2020, we launched **Opera Everywhere**, our reimagined slate of programming created especially for that continued period of uncertainty. Through interactive videos, podcast conversations, and panel discussions on YouTube, your participation in these programs — from over 90 countries around the world — truly brought opera everywhere and made more than **10 million impressions** across our channels.

## SOLO SPOTLIGHTS

In an ongoing series, COC Music Director **Johannes Debus** turned the spotlight on incredible artists often unseen by opera audiences — the brilliant instrumentalists of the COC Orchestra. Over four episodes, each centered on a different opera, orchestra members discuss the pivotal musical moments in a score where the spotlight is on them. With a mix of personal anecdotes, technical tidbits, and stories from just below the stage, each episode was capped with a live solo performance of the excerpt. Nearly 3,000 viewers tuned in to meet this season's guests: COC Concertmaster **Marie Bérard**, Principal Clarinet **Dominic Desautels** (right), flute and piccolo player **Shelley Brown**, and Principal Horn **Scott Wevers**.

# KEY CHANGE: A COC PODCAST

With bi-weekly episodes from late October through early June, this digital audio series explored the operagoing experience from a variety of perspectives, with invigorating conversations about the past, present, and future of the art form. Featuring guests from the opera field and beyond - including COC's own General Director **Perryn** Leech, soprano Sondra Radvanovsky, actor/director Michael Greyeyes and novelist Cherie Dimaline - each episode was cohosted by classical singer and culture critic Robyn Grant-Moran, a member of the COC's Circle of Artists. alongside Canadian stage director, dramaturg, and COC Academy graduate Julie McIsaac. With 16 full-length episodes plus a much-loved (and highly entertaining) bonus episode featuring soprano Rebecca Caine, Key Change gained listeners in over **30 countries**, including Norway, South Korea, Bahrain, and Belgium, with 9,000 downloads over the course of the season.

# MINDBODYMUSIC

Hosted by COC Composer-in-Residence

Ian Cusson (below), this digital panel
discussion in October brought together
artists and scientists to explore the positive
physical and mental impacts of experiencing
and participating in music. Panellists
included Ensemble Studio soprano Jamie

Groote, alongside active musicians

Dr. SarahRose Black, Dr. Charles Limb, and Dr. Swathi Swaminathan, representing the fields of psychotherapy, neuroscience, and psychology respectively. Viewers were able to ask questions in real-time in a live Q&A that followed, with nearly 800 people having caught the chat on YouTube.


### **GENDER & OPERA**

Expanding on the COC's popular Women in Opera event, this digital roundtable brought together artists and creators from across the arts industry to talk about personal experiences dealing with gender constructs and how they'd like to see change in the performing arts. The discussion and live Q&A was moderated by **Aria Umezawa**, Canadian stage director and cofounder of COC's new Disruptor-in-Residence, **Amplified Opera**. Panellists included: **Avery Jean Brennan**, **Jonathan Christopher**, Ensemble Studio artist **Jonah Spungin** and Amplified co-founders **Teiya Kasahara 笠原 貞野**, **Marion Newman**, and **Asitha Tennekoon**. # GROWING THE NEXT GENERATION OF OPERA LOVERS



In the summer of 2020, we launched **Opera Makers**, a series of interactive video
tutorials for young people. The digital
program was so successful, it expanded
into tailored collaborations, connecting
COC teaching artists with local partner
organizations. Programming not only
supported and responded to community
needs and enriched educational curriculum
through opera creation projects, it opened

new pathways into the art form for young audiences.

Opera Makers uses hands-on activities to explore every element of an opera, from storytelling and composition, to performance and design. Participants create their own operas, empowering them to tell the stories of their own communities and lived experiences through music.

Thank you to all of the wonderful teaching artists and collaborators at the COC and our partner organizations for an incredible year of opera-making!

#### SEPTEMBER - DECEMBER

Opera Makers' new community programming launched in the fall in partnership with **Sistema Toronto**, a free after-school music and social development program for children living in underserved communities. Through virtual workshops, COC and Sistema teaching artists facilitated the creation of the program's first digital opera premiere, *Change of Heart*, complete with scenery created with custom Zoom backdrops.

#### OCTOBER — DECEMBER

In October, Opera Makers began a new collaboration with **West Neighbourhood House** in Toronto. Through weekly online workshops, COC teaching artists worked with young opera makers ages 7-12 to produce *Trial by Fire*, an original opera centred on the importance of environmental caretaking.

#### OCTOBER - MAY

In a season-long project aimed at closing gaps in literacy and numeracy, Opera Makers partnered with **Heydon Park Secondary School** in Toronto to integrate different forms of learning into HPSS's curriculum. Participants composed original songs, designed and costumed characters, and — throughout the year — were introduced to COC craftspeople in collaborative sessions that highlighted the many tangible entry points into a creative vocation. This spring, more than 70 people attended the virtual finale of the students' hard work, *The Light of Hope*.

#### MARCH - JUNE

In an Opera Makers first, COC teaching artists teamed up with **Building Roots**, a grassroots organization that fosters social cohesion across Toronto's Downtown East and the **Youth Enrichment Academy (YEA!)**, an initiative designed to address gaps in after-school programming for youth in Regent Park and surrounding communities. Weekly online workshops complemented YEA!'s virtual programming, providing several students with their very first opera, and sometimes music, experience. The students' original opera, *Dreaming Up Change*, premiered this June.

#### APRIL - JUNE

Opera Makers evolved further this spring with the Arts Connected program at **St. Elizabeth Catholic High School** in Thornhill, Ontario. For the first time, COC teaching artists worked with the entire music department, with different grades responsible for different areas of opera creation. After virtual sessions that included working directly with professional opera artists, the students' opera *Elevator Music* saw its virtual debut in June.

#### MAY - JUNE

As the Opera Makers program continues to grow, a new partnership with **York Region District School Board** is teaching students the elements of musical composition: participants create bars of original music, which COC teaching artists help to build into a full piece!

# MENTORING THE NEXT GENERATION OF OPERA STARS

Thanks to your support, the **COC Academy**, our one-of-a-kind career development program, was able to continue mentorship and training activities through digital sessions and virtual workshops. These programs provide emerging opera professionals and creators with the skills,

experiences, and resources to thrive in a global opera environment. Through virtual sessions, our artists were able to keep honing their artistry, technique, and craft, readying them for the moment they can once again return to the stage and share their talent.



## **ENSEMBLE STUDIO**

The Ensemble Studio is our young artist development program for opera singers and pianists/coaches. These early-career artists receive a blend of advanced study and practical experience through an individually tailored, multi-year program.

While the pandemic prevented in-person coachings and workshops from moving forward and severely limited live performance opportunities, the Ensemble Studio used this time to expand the development and mentorship opportunities that artists could participate in virtually, including:

- Regular one-on-one coachings & roundtables with COC Music Director
   Johannes Debus.
- Professional development sessions to equip artists for their careers as freelance opera professionals, including career management and representation, agents, civic engagement, and finance.
- A series of training workshops focusing on building capacity and digital skills including acting for film, self-recording and editing, digital self-promotion and personal websites.
- Remote coachings and masterclasses with special guests, including: Jane Archibald, Russell Braun, Gerald Finley, Adrianne Pieczonka, and Russell Thomas.
- Participation in public industry roundtables, including the COC's MindBodyMusic and Gender & Opera panels, and Musique 3 Femmes' fall popup conference discussing new works.
- Introducing opera to young creatives in sessions with the Canadian Children's Opera Company and Spring Break at the COC programming.

# COMPOSER-IN-RESIDENCE

As Composer-in-Residence, **Ian Cusson** has been working on *Fantasma*, a new opera commission written with young audiences in mind. Cusson's residency has contributed to the collaborative training

approach of the COC Academy: members of the Ensemble Studio were able to participate in workshopping a new opera, and the development of *Fantasma* provided the basis of our Spring Break at the COC program.

## SPRING BREAK AT THE COC: EXPLORING NEW OPERA

In April, students of all ages tuned in for virtual sessions exploring the creation of *Fantasma*. Hosted by COC Opera Teaching Artist **Makenzie Morgan**, Spring Break at the COC gathered a group of artists and craftspeople to explore different career paths in the performing arts.

Facilitators included COC Composer-in-Residence, and composer of *Fantasma*, **Ian Cusson**. Ensemble Studio artists

Matthew Cairns and Alex Soloway, Wig & Make-up Supervisor Sharon Ryman, Costume Supervisor Sandra Corazza, Props Supervisor Wulf Higgins, music therapist Dr. SarahRose Black, and dramaturg and director of Fantasma, Julie McIsaac.

# DISRUPTOR-IN-RESIDENCE

In January 2021, we announced a new addition to the COC Academy: the **Disruptor-in-Residence**.

Toronto-based **Amplified Opera** was selected as the first participant in this unique, two-year residency, which offers resources and support during the critical transition period from start-up to established organization. Throughout the residency, Amplified Opera will have the

chance to share ideas and resources with a large organization like the COC; members of Amplified Opera will also contribute insights and ideas to COC programs, such as the Gender & Opera panel held in March 2021. The artistic collaboration aims to support increased equity, diversity, and inclusivity within the arts through workshops and training for fellow artists, as well as activities that foster greater community engagement.

Amplified Opera is co-founded by Canadian performing artists (below, left to right) **Teiya Kasahara 笠原 貞野** (they/them), **Marion Newman** (she/her), **Asitha Tennekoon** (he/him), and Canadian stage director **Aria Umezawa** (she/her). The company launched publicly in the fall of 2019 with AMPLIFY, a series of concert recitals and panels that explored stories of blindness and vision loss; gender expectations in opera; and differences in Black identity across the U.S.-Canadian border.



# INVESTING IN THE FUTURE OF OPERA

As we look ahead to reopening the Four Seasons Centre for the Performing Arts and producing live opera once again, we're investing in equipment to ensure we can connect audiences across the country — and world — to their favourite operas and artists for years to come.

Thanks to support from the federal government, a new digital infrastructure project has equipped the Four Seasons Centre, along with the rehearsal space at the COC's administrative headquarters at 227 Front St. E., with top-of-the-line equipment for digital content capture, dramatically expanding the reach of the company's artistic activities and programming.


