Jonelle Sills - soprano

Jonelle Sills is one of the most exciting young sopranos of her generation. Named one of CBC Music's "30 hot classical musicians under 30" in 2020, Sills recently made her company debut at the Canadian Opera Company as Mimì in La Bohème, a performance that was lauded as being a "beautifully sensitive Mimi with careful control and colour" (The Globe and Mail). This season also sees role debuts as Donna Anna in *Don Giovanni* at Edmonton Opera, Micaëla in *Carmen* at Vancouver Opera (VO), Anna Glawari in *The Merry* Widow at Toronto Operetta Theatre, and, in recital for the Prince Edward County Chamber Festival with the Viano Quartet. Other recent engagements include Sills returning to VO to make her mainstage debut as Helena in Britten's A Midsummer Night's Dream, joining the star-studded all-Canadian cast of Sondheim's A Little Night Music at Koerner Hall, her return to the National Arts Centre Orchestra under the batons of Alexander Shelley, Dinuk Wijeratne, and Cosette Justo Valdés, and, joining the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir for Brahms' Requiem. Sills' past highlights include her Canadian tour as Mimì in La Bohème with Toronto's Against The Grain Theatre (AtG), as a recital soloist with Ottawa Chamberfest, her

residency at the Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity for their Opera in the 21st Century program where she premiered the role of Esther in Poala Prestini and Royce Vavreck's *Silent Light*, and her company debut with AtG in Vivier's *Kopernikus*, which earned her a 2019 Dora Award as a member of the ensemble.



Jorell Williams - baritone

American baritone Jorell Williams, known for having "a solid vocal core and easy, natural production" (*Opera News*) and "a deliciously resonant baritone voice" (*Broadway World*) has been heralded as "a rock-solid singer with a keen understanding of his own expressive depths" (*The Washington Post*), is gracing the world's most prominent concert and opera stages.

Now based in Toronto, this season showcases Williams in debut engagements with the Ottawa Choral Society, Symphony Nova Scotia, Opera Omaha, Greek National Opera, Catapult Opera, the Canadian Art Song Project, and returns to the Elmer Iseler Singers, the National Philharmonic Orchestra, and Brooklyn Art Song Society.

Williams is widely recognized for his concert work, having performed as a soloist in Bach's *Magnificat*, Handel's *Messiah*, Orff's Carmina Burana as well as Brahms' *Ein Deutsches Requiem*, Vaughan Williams' *Dona Nobis Pacem* and Beethoven's Ninth Symphony.

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Steven Philcox - piano

Highly regarded as one of Canada's finest collaborators, pianist Steven Philcox is a frequent partner of Canada's vocal elite performing in concert halls both at home and abroad. His extensive recital experience, interest in non-traditional approaches to performance, and curiosity for repertoire outside the standard canon have inspired innovation in program curation and recital presentation.

From 1999 to 2010, Philcox was a celebrated member of the music staff of the COC, where he served as Répétiteur and Assistant Conductor on more than 35 productions and was the pianist of choice for baroque and classical continuo. In 2006, Philcox distinguished himself in an auspicious debut conducting the company's final performance of Mozart's *Cosi fan tutte* at the newly opened Four Seasons Centre for the Performing Arts. Other conducting credits with the company (as Assistant Conductor) include performances of Gounod's *Faust*, Britten's *Albert Herring* and Rossini's *The Barber of Seville*.

As a pedagogue, Philcox has given masterclasses throughout North America and is regularly invited to mentor young artists at many prestigious training programs. Recent highlights include Opera on the Avalon, Vancouver International Song Institute, University of Texas, Austin, Canadian Opera Company's Ensemble Studio, Stratford Summer Music Vocal Academy, Ukrainian Art Song Project Summer Institute, and the Centre for Operatic Studies in Italy. He is the director of the Art of Song program at Toronto Summer Music Festival and has been an invited jury member for vocal and piano competitions throughout Canada.

Philcox is Associate Professor and head of Collaborative Piano studies at the University of Toronto's Faculty of Music. He is a founding Co-Artistic Director of Canadian Art Song Project and has recorded for the Stone Records and Centrediscs labels.

Canadian Art Song Project

Canadian Art Song Project (s) was founded in 2011 by tenor Lawrence Wiliford and pianist Steven Philcox. Its mission is to build on the rich legacy of Canadian song by engaging composers, writers, and performers to create new music while also providing opportunities for Canadian artists to champion the wealth of existing song literature.

Since its inception, CASP has commissioned 19 new works including those by Brian Harman/David Brock, Brian Current, James Rolfe/André Alexis, Marjan Mozetich, Tawnie Olson, Jeffrey Ryan, Cecilia Livingston, Ana Sokolović, Abigail Richardson-Schulte, Maria Thompson Corley, and Christos Hatzis.

CASP recordings are available on the Centrediscs label. Their recording *Summer Night* (2019), dedicated to the solo songs of Healey Willan, was nominated for a JUNO in 2020 as Classical Album of the year: Vocal or Choral. Their 2024 release entitled *Known to Dreamers* highlights contributions of Black Canadian composers and poets to Canadian art song.

In addition to research, commissioning and recording, Canadian Art Song Project presents recitals and performances that highlight song in traditional and innovative ways through partnerships with arts organizations across Canada.

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
