The Black Fish Ensemble

The Black Fish Ensemble is excited to perform *The Black Fish* by JUNO-nominated composer, Keyan Emami. *The Black Fish* is a three-movement composition, freely adapted from a well-known Iranian children's book called *The Little Black Fish*. The eclectic instrumentation of this ensemble (strings, clarinet, vibraphone, percussion, and live narration) draws on Western classical, Middle Eastern magam, jazz, and improvised music to tell the story of a little black fish who is looking to explore beyond her home at the little pond, while also reflecting on the composer's personal story of leaving his homeland and embracing the life beyond.

Beth Silver is thrilled to be part of a community in which she can thrive on her intuition and creativity. Admired for her ability to paint in many colours through her instrument, she enjoys capturing character and spontaneity in musicespecially amidst interactive chamber settings. From high school through her master's degree, Silver studied with Simon Fryer, Shauna Rolston, Matt Haimovitz, and Rachel Mercer. Silver is the recipient of numerous awards including the Ben Steinberg Musical Legacy Award recognizing musical achievement in the Canadian Jewish community. She has performed in tours and festivals around the world, such as Salzburg's Kammermusik Festival, Glasgow's Celtic Connections Festival, the Napa Valley Festival del Sole, and Debut Atlantic, Prairie Debut, and Jeunesses Musicales tours with the Ladom Ensemble, and recently received a prestigious grant to study traditional Jewish music in Romania. A lover of many genres, Silver is equally at home in a classical ensemble as she is in a band exploring new voices for cello, though she holds an entirely Canadian classical-focused education. As hobbies, she enjoys painting, horticulture, yoga, and hanging with her cat Sica.

Jenna Richards embraces a demanding schedule

as a portfolio musician, including performance, public speaking, research, and arts programming. She has performed around the world from Toronto to Salzburg, organized national research projects, spoken at The Walrus talks and Harvard University, and programmed over 1,000 musical events. Throughout her undergraduate and master's degrees, Richards was heavily involved in performance and productions in Toronto and Ottawa. Favourites in recent years include Acadia's Sunday Music in the Garden Room, Music at Mill Road, New Music Now series, Ottawa Chamberfest, adaptive concerts for children with exceptionalities, and performances for palliative care centers. Richards holds nine consecutive Nova Scotia Talent Trust awards and is currently pursuing her PhD in Interdisciplinary Research in Music, serving as the Associate Music Director for the Canadian Centennial Choir and a board member for Xenia Concerts Inc., and programming various artistic streams as Director of Artistic Planning and Community Engagement at Ottawa Chamberfest. In her (little) downtime, Richards loves being in nature, playing soccer, and learning languages.
