INTRODUCING WAGNER'S The Flying Dutchman

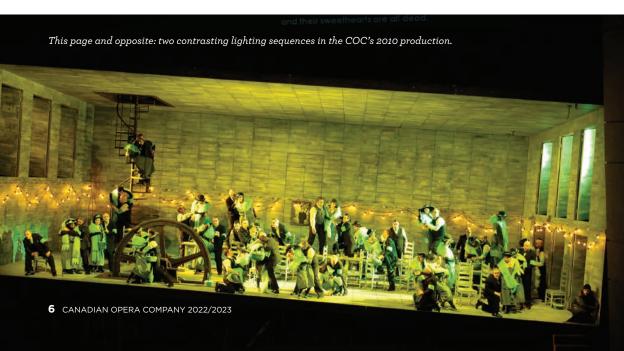
After last anchoring at the COC in 2010, Richard Wagner's monumental and mysterious opera *The Flying Dutchman* returns with its inimitable mix of striking visuals, storm-tossed music, and haunting ghost story.

The Dutchman has been cursed to sail for eternity—that is, unless he's able to find a pure and true love. Every seven years he can step ashore for a single day in an attempt to break the curse, but he has yet to find a love that can redeem him.

In this acclaimed, signature production from American director Christopher Alden, we're first introduced to Senta, a young woman who doesn't quite fit in with the rest of her seaside village. As the overture begins, we see her transfixed by the painted image of a man she's never met and, through the swell of the orchestra, feel the weight of her yearning and the power of the sea all around her.

We soon learn that the enigmatic man in the painting is in fact, the Dutchman, who has just anchored nearby with his ghostly crew and offered Senta's father a handsome reward for her hand in marriage. However, he is not the only person with an interest in Senta's heart, leaving audiences to wonder if the Dutchman's day on land will end in him escaping his curse or being banished once more to sail for seven years.

Though fantastical in nature, there's some autobiographical truth woven into this Wagner opera. Back in 1839, the composer had accumulated a significant amount of debt. In an attempt to evade his creditors, Wagner and his wife Minna smuggled themselves aboard a London-bound ship in the middle of the night. What should have been a relatively easy, eight-day passage stretched into a miserable threeweek voyage, with everyone aboard being tossed in violent storms and roiling waves.



Between bouts of seasickness, Wagner is said to have overheard sailors discussing the legend of the Flying Dutchman, fuelling the composer's imagination with the haunting story.

In this particular production, helmed by revival director Marilyn Gronsdal, the action is set in the early 20th-century. The overall aesthetic draws heavily on the German Expressionist movement and there's a painterly quality to the sets and costumes by designer Allen Moyer. Perhaps most striking is the steep angle upon which the action takes place, known in theatre as a "double-raked" stage. Audiences are in effect presented with a remarkable visual that evokes the dramatic off-kilter feeling of a ship deck in rough waters and an eerie atmosphere that follows the Dutchman on land. Lighting design from Anne Militello casts a supernatural aspect on the action unfolding onstage.

Go big or go home!

DIVE INTO THE MUSIC OF THE FLYING DUTCHMAN WITH COC MUSIC DIRECTOR JOHANNES DEBUS

When The Flying Dutchman sets sail this season, it will be Johannes Debus leading the cast, COC Orchestra, and Chorus through Wagner's epic score and, for Johannes, the opera holds a particularly special significance: it was the first opera he conducted as COC Music Director. after officially joining the Canadian Opera Company in 2010.

"I was originally supposed to conduct this in 2020, marking my tenth anniversary with the COC," he recalls. "Of course, because of the pandemic, we're celebrating a full two years later! But it's remarkable to think of the journey we've all been through and it's exciting to bring this opera about a famously epic journey back to our audiences."

We asked Johannes what he loves best about this opera-and how his relationship with opera and Wagner has evolved since his first turn at the COC podium.

Do you have a favourite part of the score?

The opera starts with an exhibarating piece of music, the overture to The Flying Dutchman, about 10 minutes long. Right away, we are thrown into the opera, into the forces of nature. And we're thrown into the inner worlds of what we later see the characters dealing with. So basically, everything that happens in the opera, we have in a nutshell, in this overture. And I tell you, it's an exciting piece of music to play for any orchestra. And it's an exciting piece of music to conduct.

Are there any other key musical moments audiences should listen for?

Well there is, of course, the famous Dutchman monologue; it's the first time we encounter the Dutchman and he tells us about his story and his tragic fate. There's also the famous Act II ballad sung by Senta, in the form of a kind of monologue. It's here that we hear about her yearning and about this inexplicable relationship she seems to feel with the painting of the Dutchman.





But The Flying Dutchman also hones in on this closed community of sorts and so the chorus features quite heavily. The score includes a number of famous operatic choruses—singing is what people here seem to do when they're not working, and also as a way of getting through their daily tasks. So in Act I. we hear the sailors singing whilst working. In Act II, we hear the female chorus, while they sit at their spinning wheels. And in Act III, we find the community dancing and drinking and having a great time after work—it feels almost like polka music!

How does conducting this opera feel different to you this time?

It's for me, personally, one of the greatest gifts to be able to revisit The Flying Dutchman, here at the COC. It's like revisiting an old friend! I think there's perhaps two predominant feelings that arise—the first is quite nostalgic, as the wonderful memories of that first time bubble up and I get to just bathe in the lovely

memories. But, since then, there's also a new sense of pride; I've achieved a lot, together with the COC Orchestra, and time has also enabled me to discover so many new aspects of the piece that I hadn't seen in 2010. I think it will be very interesting to compare the two experiences on the other side of this run!

What do you think audiences are going to love most about this opera?

With Wagner it's "Go big or go home!" And it's the same with *The Flying Dutchman*. It's overwhelming and unforgettable—especially in this iconic COC production.

SYNOPSIS

Scene i

On Daland's ship

Daland, a sea-captain, drops anchor near his home harbour, and orders the Steersman to keep watch. The tired man falls asleep and fails to see the arrival of the Dutchman's ship, which anchors beside Daland's vessel. When Daland discovers the strange ship he calls to its captain, who identifies himself simply as "a Dutchman" and offers a rich reward for one night's lodging. He then offers his fabulous treasure as a dowry for the hand of Daland's daughter, and Daland eagerly agrees.

Scene ii

Daland's home

Daland's daughter, Senta, stares at a portrait of the Flying Dutchman while the women around her sing as they work. Senta then sings a song about the Dutchman, a seacaptain condemned by Satan to sail for eternity. He is permitted to set foot on land only once every seven years, to search for salvation in a woman's love. Mary, Senta's companion, scolds Senta for her obsession with this legend, and tells her that when her father returns, she will ask him to remove from the house the picture of the Dutchman. Erik, Senta's suitor, enters to say that he has seen her father's ship sailing towards

harbour. He presses her to ask her father to give him her hand. Senta, however, continues to speak of her fascination with the Flying Dutchman, and Erik tells her of a dream in which he saw her embrace a strange seaman. In despair, Erik leaves.

INTERMISSION

Daland then enters with his guest, and Senta is mesmerized by the Dutchman, whom she recognizes from the portrait. Daland explains that the stranger has asked for her hand in marriage and leaves the couple together. Senta agrees to marry the Dutchman.

Scene iii

By the Dutchman's ship

After a party of celebrating, sailors and their women are terrified by an encounter with the Dutchman's ghostly crew. Erik and Senta enter. Erik is angry, as he has learned that Senta has accepted the hand of the Dutchman. As Erik reminds Senta of her promise to love him, the Dutchman enters and overhears the exchange. Convinced that Senta is lost to him, the Dutchman is overwhelmed with despair. He tells Senta of the curse and sets sail with his men. Proclaiming her eternal faithfulness to the Dutchman, Senta dies.

SYNOPSIS IN A MINUTE: The Dutchman is a doomed sailor cursed to sail the seas without respite, only able to set foot on shore for one day every seven years. If he can find a woman on that day who will vow to love him until death, his curse will be broken. When the Dutchman meets Senta, she makes that vow, and when her former suitor threatens the pact, she proves her love, sacrificing herself for the Dutchman.

MEET OUR CARMENS

Two dazzling mezzo-sopranos, J'Nai Bridges and Rihab Chaieb, take on one of the most iconic roles in all operas in our production of *Carmen*.



Sizzling with dramatic storytelling and a brilliant musical score, George Bizet's Carmen is recognized today as one of the most popular operas in the world. However, when Carmen first premiered in 1875 at the Opéra-Comique theatre in Paris, it was a disaster. (The failed premiere was so dispiriting to Bizet that it was said to have contributed to the young composer's death, which came only three months after Carmen opened). Critics and audiences in 1875 objected to the opera's overtly sexual themes, morally ambiguous characters, and especially Carmen herself: a female protagonist who stood in defiance of social norms and embraced the possibilities of her own freedom.

Yet Carmen's fiercely independent nature is precisely what makes her one of the most deeply interesting and iconic heroines in all opera, with show-stopping musical moments to match. Her signature aria "L'amour est un oiseau rebelle" ("Love is a rebellious bird")—otherwise known as "Habanera"—is instantly recognizable as a compelling piece of melody-making that also offers depth of characterization and shades of psychological nuance.

Carmen also happens to be one of opera's few leading roles for the mezzo-soprano voice, which is considered a richer, deeper, earthier sound than the soprano voice, which is brighter and higher in range. In

most classical opera repertoire, sopranos are the lead roles, while mezzo-sopranos are typically consigned to enacting the secondary characters in the plot (a trusted wise woman, a witch or a nurse, or the occasional 'trouser role' in which a female singer depicts a young male character), but not so in Carmen, which showcases the expressive quality and richness of the mezzo vocal range.

This fall audiences have the chance to see two dazzling mezzo-sopranos take on this famous part: two-time Grammy Awardwinner J'Nai Bridges makes her highly anticipated COC debut, while Ensemble Studio graduate Rihab Chaieb makes a triumphant return to the Four Seasons Centre stage. Below, find out more about their relationship to Carmen, their favourite moments of the opera, and what they're looking forward to in Toronto.

What was your first professional role?

J'Nai Bridges [JB]: I consider my first professional role to be with the Knoxville Opera in 2014. I was actually still in the Young Artists program at the Lyric Opera of Chicago, and sang Adalgisa in Norma, which was an amazing experience.

Rihab Chaieb [RC]: I sang the Third Boy in Mozart's The Magic Flute at Opéra de Montréal. I was still in my undergrad at McGill University. It was my first real experience in the whole "machine" that is opera. I loved roaming backstage, looking at how people got prepared, how scenes were changed, etc.

What was your first experience with Carmen—either as a performer or audience member?

JB: My first experience with *Carmen* was actually not operatic, it was Beyonce's



hip hopera Carmen! I'll never forget how mesmerized I was... not only by her, but the story, and it was so accessible for me. In 2009, I saw Carmen at The Met. It was a new production featuring Elīna Garanča and Roberto Alagna (who I've now sung with, which is completely incredible and full circle), but I just remember thinking, this production is absolutely spellbinding. That was really when I thought, I have to sing this role one day.

RC: My first time singing *Carmen* was in a very unconventional production in Germany. I was ready for the castanets and the flamenco and all the seduction that comes with Carmen. Well... that wasn't guite it! It was more like G.I.-Jane meets Orange-Isthe-New-Black Carmen! It was a physically difficult production because there was a good amount of fighting, and Carmen was on stage for the entirety of the show. This production kicked away any preconceived ideas of what Carmen should be. Carmen doesn't have to necessarily be the stereotype everyone expects; she can surprise you.

How much do you relate to the character of Carmen?

JB: I actually really closely identify with Carmen, in that I say what I mean and I mean what I say. Like Carmen, I too need a lot of freedom. I've been like that since I was a little girl. I was always needing a bit more space than most children (or adults), so I identify with her in that way. I feel like Carmen is also a woman and character that is just "living in the moment" and I really strive for that in all I do.

RC: Carmen is such a multifaceted role. We all have a little Carmen in us. She is a modern woman stuck in an era that didn't suit her. In the opera she talks a lot about "liberté", freedom. I do feel she encapsulates the term generally but in her inner self, she talks about freedom of women. To me, that is the true freedom that Carmen talks about in the final act: if you cannot let me be me. live my life as my own self, if you continue to impose yourself on me, that is not a life of freedom. It is not a life worth living for. And that is something that speaks to me tremendously.

What's your favourite moment of the opera?

JB: This is tough as there are so many favorite moments in the opera for me! I will say something that does stand out for me is in Act III, specifically the Card Aria ("En vain pour éviter"). It's Carmen's last aria that is discussing her fate. I feel as though

it is a real turning point for her character there is no getting around it, the cards do not lie and it is only a matter of time. Musically, it is extremely compelling—I think every movement from Bizet is brilliant, but I feel like this Card Aria, the trio, really says it all. It stresses "This is it, this is her fate," meanwhile Frasquita and Mercédès have this very jovial music that features them gorgeously. So there is a real juxtaposition of these worlds. In general, I find that Act III is most exciting for me-also Don José's music where you really see him start to lose it. It brings a new wave of drama in this act.

RC: Musically, it's the "Entr'acte" before the final act. It has the power to truly transport me. It's incredibly lush in sound—and gutsy! I sincerely feel the pure essence of flamenco in that last Entr'acte. Dramatically, it will always be the final duet between Carmen and Don José.

What are you looking forward to most while you're in Toronto?

JB: I'm most looking forward to being in the city! I've heard nothing but great reviews and feedback about Toronto-how diverse it is, how beautiful and fun it is—so, I'm looking forward to exploring Toronto! Every time I approach this role, it's so exciting because I get to delve into a different interpretation or different production and team: I love the creative process, so I'm really looking forward to being in the amazing city of Toronto and collaborating and creating with friends, some new colleagues, and a new team!

RC: Coming back to a place that saw me grow (the company and the city). As a graduate of the COC Ensemble Studio, this is a huge deal for me. I've spent several crucial years in Toronto. It shaped who I am now professionally but also personally. I look forward to seeing friends at the COC and

Toronto who I haven't seen in years. I look forward to fall in Canada, to Riverdale Park, to biking the Don Valley on Sundays, to getting a warm cinnamon bun from Evergreen Brick Works. All of these things that made my life in Toronto special years ago, I'm very much looking forward to.

What non-opera music are you listening to?

JB: My playlist is all over the place, but lately, I've been really into Afrobeats! I just love this genre, Burna Boy particularly! I've also been listening to Diana Ross. I've never really listened to or experienced her music and I came across a song called "The Boss" that I've been playing on repeat. I've also been listening to the full "The Boss" album and going down a Diana Ross rabbit hole!

RC: Right now I'm drinking Florence + the Machine, I saw them live this summer in Portugal and it was insane. My playlist is... eclectic to say the least! I listen to pop, French pop, I'm feeling Rosalía right now, Latin pop, Italian pop, I'm listening to Kate Bush, house music, hip hop, rock, binaural beats sounds, 70s, 80s, 90s (I love how the 90s are making a comeback right now. I'm a 90s baby so I'm all here for it).



DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Welcome back to Carmen. The world has changed and so has Carmen. This opera is easily one of my favourite operas as it allows you to look at the world today through the lens of one of the greatest operas ever written.

Why Carmen and why now? Carmen is not a new opera. It has stood the test of time to emerge as one of the best-loved works in the operatic canon. I can't help but feel that this piece was the entertainment of the time. Everything about this show is spectacle, busyness, and excitement: the chorus is on stage practically the entire length of the opera which gives us plenty to look at and take in, and the numerous memorable melodies have us humming as we leave the theatre.

For me, what has allowed this piece to endure through the years, from 1875 to the present, are the real characters in real situations. Now more than ever, this piece is a reminder of the freedom that we all enjoy and also the chains that we can find ourselves bound by. Freedom and choice and restrictions and captivity have taken on new meanings for us after what we have endured over the last few years.

This opera can be like looking in a mirror. It lets us see one another in different situations and understand what leads us to make the choices we make.

Bizet wrote a piece that triggers our impulses, and questions morality. It can be difficult to find a likeable character, or one that we truly want to be. Instead, he's painted characters that embody several different aspects that we are simultaneously drawn to but can also disassociate from.

This isn't just another Carmen; this is our Carmen. This is our moment to come together as a community, learn something new about this opera (even for those who have seen it many times), and learn something new about each other.

As Philip Glass said, "If you don't need a new technique (approach), then what you're saying probably isn't new." It is impossible not to see this show with new understanding and appreciation.

I hope you will, as I do, see this production for what it is: a stunning piece of music theatre that we can all find ourselves in.

SYNOPSIS

ACTI

Micaëla, a young peasant girl, is searching for her beloved, the corporal Don José. During the changing of the guard, a group of women take a break from their work at a cigar factory. One of them, Carmen, has many admirers but she tries to attract the attention of Don José who remains indifferent to her, despite the flower she has tossed at him. A short time later, the beautiful Carmen is arrested following a disagreement with another factory worker, and Don José is assigned to arrest her. Falling under her spell, the corporal allows her to escape, landing him in jail.

ACT II

Carmen and her friends have gathered at a tavern, when a passing parade celebrates the victorious bullfighter, Escamillo. Zuniga, Don José's lieutenant who is in love with Carmen too, tells Carmen that Don José has been released from jail. Don José soon arrives at the tavern and Carmen demands that he give up his commission and follow her into the mountains with the smugglers. Meanwhile, Zuniga has caught up with Don José and tries to convince the corporal to come home with him. Don José, torn between duty and desire and jealous

of Zuniga's affection for Carmen, defies his superior. In the end, he has no choice but to accept his actions and flee into the mountains with Carmen and the band of smugalers.

INTERMISSION

ACT III

As the smugglers move through the mountains, Carmen becomes less and less tolerant of her lover's possessive and controlling behaviour. Escamillo, who has also followed them in search of Carmen, arrives. A fight ensues between Don José and Escamillo but is interrupted by Micaëla who has come to tell Don José that his mother is dying. Micaëla and Don José leave together.

ACT IV

On the day of the great bullfight, Carmen and Escamillo swear their love to each other. A haggard Don José appears at the arena and begs, then demands, Carmen to return to him but she refuses, throwing down the ring he had once given her. Don José, in despair, charges at Carmen, stabbing her. She dies as the crowd cheers the toreador in the corrida.

SYNOPSIS IN A MINUTE: Carmen is a seductive, freedom-loving woman, desired by many. She takes Don José, a young soldier, as her latest lover, who defects from the army to join her in her smuggling life. But when she spurns him for the exciting toreador Escamillo, Don José cannot accept her rejection. Their final encounter, outside the bull ring, ends tragically when Don José stabs her to death.

AN EVENING IN THE SPOTLIGHT:

Supporting the Next Generation of Opera Talent

On Thursday, November 3, Canada's top voices will be at the Four Seasons Centre for the Performing Arts, competing for your vote to be the next opera star. We caught up with the 2019 competition winner, soprano Midori Marsh, to get her perspective on what makes Centre Stage such a thrilling opportunity for emerging artists and music fans alike.

COC: Do you remember what you felt when your name was announced as the winner at Centre Stage?

Midori Marsh [MM]: It was totally surreal! I had been feeling like I was going to faint that entire time and then I robot-walked up to get the award. It's a memory that's in my brain forever.

COC: What were the immediate moments of celebration like afterwards?

MM: I don't remember immediately afterwards, I was just so excited! But then I recall being upstairs in the opera house to do another photo shoot and meet the supporters for my award, and then I remember taking off my heels as soon as I possibly could and putting on my big old boots. Then the first person I saw was my dad, my biggest fan. I knew he was in the audience, obviously. He and I were probably the two most excited people in the audience! We found each other in the crowd.

COC: What kinds of doors has winning the competition opened up for you?

MM: I've gotten to do so many amazing things in the Ensemble Studio: sing on the stage of the Four Seasons Centre many times, to perform many times with the COC Orchestra; I get to work with such amazing artists, amazing conductors, I get star-struck by my own co-workers, which is so cool!

COC: For music lovers who are planning on joining us at Centre Stage this year, what advice would you give them as they get set to hear a roster of young singers and make a selection for the Audience Choice Award?

MM: Don't overthink it! I would say there's never a clear-cut perfect artist, there's never a perfect performance, it's always about who makes you feel something. Who moves you? Whose performance did you connect with because it spoke to you—that's the person who should get your vote.

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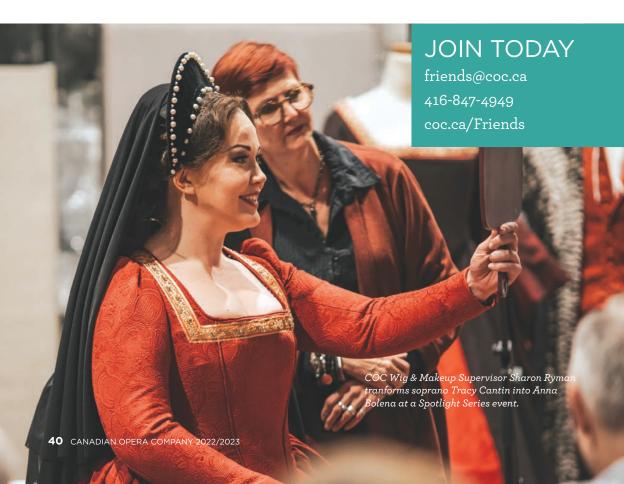




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WELCOMING BACK **OUR YOUNG ARTISTS**
