Admission Requirements:

- Post-secondary degree in Nursing from an accredited nursing education program.
- Registered in their current home state or country i.e. letter, membership card etc. and are able to practice.
- Applicants must submit a current letter from an employer's human resource department verifying employment as a nurse.

If English is not your first language you must either provide proof of English competency or take the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) or International English Language Testing System (IELTS). You must have a minimum overall band score of 6.5 on IELTS with no band lower than 6.0, or a minimum TOEFL score of 575 (paper based) or 84+ IBT with minimums of 21 (internet based) to be admitted to this program.
