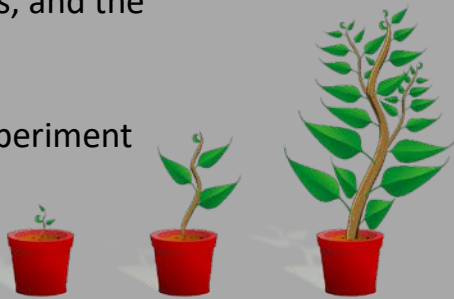

For example, in the movie Frozen, Elsa and Olaf find themselves sliding fast down a bumpy mountain. In another scene, Olaf smells a flower and has a big sneeze! Play with your child and ask questions to connect characters with events. Expand on what they say using words like *and*, *so* and *because*.
