



DIES OF WOUNDS



MAJ. J. L. CARNEGIE, only son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Carnegie, of 388 Oliver avenue, who died of wounds received in action on the Normandy front, according to word received here by his parents. A graduate of Westmount High School and employed here with the Dominion Securities Corporation, he enlisted at the outbreak of war and went overseas as a regimental officer and adjutant with the 1st Battalion, Black Watch (RHR) of Canada. He set a brilliant record at Junior Staff College in England and was posted to a Canadian brigade as a brigade major prior to the invasion of France. Prominent in skiing circles before the war, he was president of the St. Margaret's Ski Club.

James Lindsay Carnegie(1915?-1944) was a Westmount High student that went to war and died of wounds on the Norway front.
