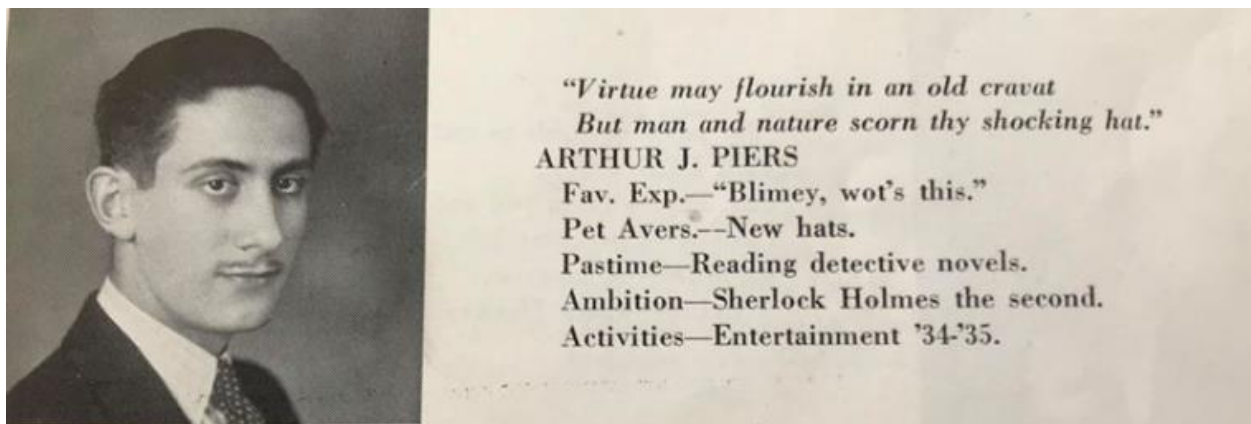

Arthur William Jarvis Piers

Arthur William Jarvis Piers was the son of Arthur Stapleton Piers and Marguerite Helen Piers. He was born on July 31st 1918. Arthur William Jarvis Piers graduated from Westmount High School in 1938, then became a part of the Royal Air Force during World War II. He served with the United Kingdom, his rank was a flying officer and his unit number was 115435. He was never found and was sadly presumed dead on March 11th 1943 at the young age of 24.



His favourite expression was "Blimey, wot's this." He loved reading books, especially detective novels and his favorite one was Sherlock Holmes the second.



His grave is in Runnymede Memorial, alongside his brother William Stapleton Piers who also sadly passed away in the Second World War. Both the brothers were never found and presumed dead but they both have a grave in honour of their memory.

FO. ARTHUR WILLIAM JARVIS PIERS, R.A.F., son of Mr. and Mrs. A. S. Piers, 10 Weredale Park, Westmount, previously listed as missing on active service after air operations, is now for official purposes presumed dead according to a casualty list issued by the R.C.A.F. FO. Piers is the second member of his family to become a casualty, his brother, Flt.-Sgt. William S. (Billy) Piers, having been reported missing on March 2, 1942, and listed as presumed dead on October 15, 1942. FO. Piers was a member of The Gazette editorial staff and resigned shortly before the declaration of war to go to England and offer his services to the R.A.F.
