


David Sproule's name on Westmount High School memorial plaque

Early Life


David Leigh Sproule, graduated in 1937, was a former student of Westmount High School. Son of professor Gordon St. George Sproule, of Mcgill University, and Mrs. Helen Louise Sproule of 39 Thornhill avenue, Westmount, Flying Officer (F/O)Sproule was born in St. Lambert, Westmount, Montreal, Quebec, Canada on May 29, 1919. He was educated in Westmount and was

prominent in school athletics, at one time holding the city championship in school gymnastics. He attended Mcgill University for three years and was twice captain of the Mcgill Gymnasium Club.


Leaving school to join the R.C.A.F (Royal Canadian Air Force), he received his wings and commission at Uplands in July, 1942. For some time he was engaged in anti-submarine patrol work on the Canadian east coast and was later posted overseas. In the United Kingdom he was pilot of a Sunderland flying boat. He was killed on active service on October 16, 1943. He was only twenty four years old at time of his death. Unfortunately there are no records of his battle details. Sproule was buried in County Fermanagh, Northern Ireland. A brother Flt-Lt. Robert Stanley Sproule, on mobile duty near London, was present at the funeral. Another brother, William Kelvin Sproule who was engaged in research with the International Nickel Company, visited his parents with his family.

Rank, Unit and Duties

David Leigh Sproule was a flying officer(F/O). He left school to join the R.C.A.F(Royal Canadian Air Force), he received his wings and commission at Uplands in July, 1942. For some time he was engaged in anti-submarine patrol work on the Canadian east coast and was later posted overseas. In the United Kingdom he was pilot of a Sunderland flying boat.


David Leigh Spoule was awarded the War Medal 1939-1945 and the 1939-45 Star.


