CENTER FOR MEDICAL EDUCATION INNOVATION

In 2020, Kansas City University (KCU) unveiled the new Center for Medical Education Innovation (CMEI), a 54,000-square-foot facility, where medical education transitions imagination to reality.

Students "learn by doing" by utilizing virtual reality (VR) and augmented reality (AR) technologies to deliver training that mirrors everyday clinical challenges faced by physicians.

In as early as their first year at KCU, medical students learn how to evaluate, diagnose and treat patients in repetition with real-world simulation. This advanced technology expands the number of simulations from two during each of the first two years of training to 30-40 curriculum-based simulations by the time they reach third-year clinical clerkships. Providing students the opportunity of repeated practice lowers the risk of medical errors and patient harm.

In addition to VR and AR technology, the CMEI houses ICU simulation sites, medical robots, 22 standardized patient rooms, and a 70-bay lab for physical diagnosis and osteopathic manipulative medicine (OMM).



COLLEGE OF DENTAL MEDICINE

KCU recently broke ground on the KCU-Joplin Farber-McIntire Campus for a new College of Dental Medicine, which will open in Fall 2023, enrolling 80 students each year. The college will utilize a general practice, communitybased model.

KCU's dental curriculum will focus on early clinical training and issues related to community and population health. Working under the supervision of adjunct faculty preceptors, fourth-year dental students will provide comprehensive oral health care in clinical partner sites to underserved patients throughout Oklahoma, Arkansas, Missouri and Kansas. It is anticipated that these student externs will provide an additional 40,000 to 50,000 patient visits annually, helping to increase access to oral health care for individuals and families in need. Recruiting students from rural areas and increasing their awareness of and exposure to rural oral health disparities improves the likelihood that KCU graduates will establish practices in underserved areas.

Southwest Missouri, southeast Kansas, northwest Arkansas and northeast Oklahoma have fewer dentists per capita than most areas in the United States. This multi-state region within a 125-mile radius of Joplin, Missouri has an immediate and critical need for more dentists, specifically

in rural and underserved communities. While dental schools cannot solve all the issues related to lack of access, the proposed KCU College of Dental Medicine is positioned to play a significant role in helping deliver oral health care in this area.





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
