


Faculty Development Training Courses

Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI) Online Courses

Step 1: Log in to IHI.org (If you are not yet registered, go to www.IHI.org/RegisterFull)

Step 2: After you have successfully logged in, go to www.IHI.org/EnterPasscode enter your KCU GME 8-digit passcode and click the "Get Access" button.



A confirmation message will appear, indicating you have joined your group and invite you into the course. Click Proceed.

Step 3: Faculty will start completing the courses.
